Transitions and changes...


- A transition is a change, a move from one state to another.
- Changes and endings can be very difficult to process.
- Change brings feelings of loss, of things 'not staying the same' and of new beginnings.
- We may have had painful experiences of change and transition in our lives.
- Parents/carers never want their child to experience sadness, anger or disappointment and so sometimes it feels easier to tell children that they will 'be fine' and it will all 'be okay'.

 Research shows that what helps children is to allow them to feel their feelings.

How can parents/carers help?


- As we come closer to the holidays, it may bring some of those past experiences of endings, up to the surface. Children will pick up on our anxieties about the move so try your best to find ways to manage how you are feeling.
- Help your child to prepare for the change by talking about it, the earlier we can do this the better, so that when the change finally comes, it won't feel so much of a shock to them.
- Children need to know that sharing their worries, fears or excitement is okay and that what they have to say will be listened to.
- Help them to separate any mixed feelings that they may have. You could try drawing/writing down their feelings first of all.
- Help them to reflect and think back to their favourite moments from the year.
- Prepare with them; calendars are helpful ways of showing the children how much time they have left of school, marking off each day together.
- Finally, wherever possible help them to have a goodbye with adults that have been important to them.
